Plan Progress Report Summary:

For this 2014 Durham City-County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Progress Report, Mitigation Planning Team reviewed the mitigation actions contained in the current Hazard Mitigation Plan and identified and analyzed the plan mitigation strategies.

The Team met on September 18, 2014. Team members were updated based on retirements of some previous team members. Topics of CRS annual recertification for City and County were discussed, as was the possible plan for future consolidation of HMP with Alamance and Orange Counties.

The status of the plan Hazard Mitigation Plan and Strategies were reviewed and determined to be completed or ongoing. Minor technical corrections were made to the Hazard Mitigation Strategies to more accurately reflect which City-County Departments are responsible for each strategy and clarify the name of our development ordinance. No substantive amendments were made to the plan or the strategies.

Recommendations are to continue implementation of the current HMP and pursue possible consolidation of future HMP with Alamance and Orange Counties before the current HMP expires in 2017. Minutes of the meeting are included at the bottom of this report.
