



# Durham County Hazard Mitigation Plan 2015 Progress Report

#### Plan Progress Report Summary:

For this 2015 Durham City-County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan Progress Report, Mitigation Planning Team reviewed the mitigation actions contained in the current Hazard Mitigation Plan and identified and analyzed the plan mitigation strategies.

The Team met on September 24, 2015. Team members in attendance were updated. Topics of CRS annual recertification for City and County were discussed, and minor technical revisions were made to the nearly finished regional hazard mitigation plan (Eno-Haw/Alamance, Durham and Orange Counties). No substantive amendments were made to the current plan or the strategies. The Eno-Haw plan has already been adopted by Orange County and FEMA has approved the plan. Adoption of the Eno-Haw plan is already on the agenda for the Durham County Board of Commissioners and will be on the agenda for the Durham City Council in the next few months. The status of the current plan Hazard Mitigation Plan and Strategies were reviewed and determined to be completed or ongoing. No changes or corrections were necessary. Recommendations are to continue with adoption of the regional plan through County and City governmental bodies and continued implementation of the current HMP until City and County adoption. The current HMP expires in 2017. Minutes of the meeting are included at the bottom of this report.
